## Information on Technical Intern Training

## — Technical Intern Training and Part-time Work —

How do you spend your leisure time when you are not busy working as a technical intern trainee? Perhaps you go shopping, go on an outing, play sports, meet with friends, or enjoy networking via the Internet. There are certainly many things to do in your free time. Perhaps some of you choose to do nothing but get a good rest, which is also a good way to spend your time.

Your status of residence, "Technical Intern Training," allows you to enter an employment contract with an implementing organization after a brief preliminary lecture period, to acquire and master industrial technologies, skills and knowledge while working in Japan. Note that it does not permit you to spend any part of your time in Japan working part-time or engaging in a sideline job. You should spend your free time to rest your body, or to indulge in a hobby or deepen your understanding of Japan such as by experiencing Japanese culture or learning Japanese. By spending your free time wisely, you could build up the necessary energy for learning new technologies and skills and achieve your original goal in coming to Japan. Moreover, by gaining greater understanding of Japanese customs and practices, you could maintain good relationships with people at your workplace.

In Japan, there are various types of part-time work. *Arubaito*, from the German word *arbeit* meaning "work," generally refers to short-term employment under an employment contract in exchange for remuneration. *Naishoku*, literally meaning "inside work," refers to manual processing work that is done at home under a contract for remuneration paid in proportion to the amount of work done.

If you, as a technical intern trainee, engage in part-time work during after-hours or on your off-days and receive payment for your labor, you may be subject to a penalty or deportation for working illegally, because such work falls outside the scope of activities permitted by your employment contract with your implementing organization. Should you be guilty of illegal work, you will not only return to your country without achieving your original purpose of acquiring technologies, skills and knowledge in Japan, but you will also cause considerable problems for your sending organization and other relevant parties back home. Keep this in mind.

Three years may seem long, but they go by before you know it. After working three years in Japan as a technical intern trainee, you are expected to apply the technologies, skills and knowledge you acquired in Japan to help promote industries and develop the economy in your country in the future. Seeing you make active efforts upon returning to your country would also be a large source of pride and joy to those to whom you are indebted.

To make your Japanese experience work for you in the future, and also to live up to the expectations of people around you, be sure to comply with all laws and regulations and treasure your stay in Japan as an exceptional period in your life.

日本での経験を自分の将来に活かすため、また、周囲の人々の またいこと 特待に応えるためにも、法令に違反しないよう注意して、日本 たいざい 滞在をかけがえのない時間にしてください。
